Oh Ye Gods Green Salad

Makes two large servings

Finely dice:

- 1/2 cucumber
- 1/4 pointed or flat cabbage

Blend the dressing:

- 1/2 bunch parsley
- 1 clove of garlic
- 3 tbsp. olive oil
- 1 tbsp. maple syrup
- 1/4 cup of lemon juice
- · Salt and chili flakes to taste
- · A little water to thin

MONIKA'S GROVE

Bumblebees

I've ordered a few varieties of plugs for spring with some selected 'just because'. Just because I like blue flowers, I will be planting blue flax (Linum lewisii). But it's good to know that this plant is hardy, loves the sun, is drought tolerant, blooms all summer, spreads by seeds, and is attractive to birds, bees, and butterflies. Blue flowers attract bees. More sky-blue, blue? Smooth blue beardtongue (Penstemon nitidus). More bees. Native bees have co-evolved with native plants.

But I'm also fascinated by plants with attributes, such as prairie smoke or old man's whiskers (Geum triflorum). It has marvellously bright, nodding burgundy flowers that form incredibly feathery seed heads. The lavender pink flowers of the wild bergamot (Monarda fistulosa) produce a wonderful spicy scent. I've had no luck with the shooting star (Primula conjugens), a little greenery, but that was it. Another attempt this year. One of my favourite flowers is the red paintbrush (Castillega miniata), a gorgeous candy-apple red with brilliant yellow streaks, which has shown up in my meadow in pink but seems to get crowded out by its grassy host. Trying again. Then there's northern bedstraw (Galium boreale), which is actually easy to grow, but also got squeezed out by more vigorous native plants. The rule of thumb has been to plant plugs about a foot apart. The blanket flower (Gaillardia aristata) and fireweed (Chamaenerion angustifolium) didn't read the memo and need a lot more room. For a quick 'fill,' these are the plants to consider. Lesson learned.

As a huge fan of native bumblebees, I was surprised to learn bee tongue length determines what plants it visits. There are some 41 bumblebee species in Canada, with 28 in Alberta. We have some of the richest, most biodiverse habitats in North America for bumblebees. In addition, bumblebees do buzz pollinating, which is important to shooting stars and your tomatoes and squashes!

I confess, I'm not out there 24/7 checking out their favorite plants, but, when you see bumblebees mobbing a flower, you notice.

Bumblebees live in the ground, under porches, in old rodent burrows, or tree hollows (another reason not to disturb the leaf litter in the fall or go digging around).

The bumblebee is eusocial, with a queen and daughters raising young bees. While the honeybee can have 60,000 bees in a hive, the bumble bee colony only has 200 or more, depending, but they don't build hives or make honey; they store nectar in 'pots.'

Another thing to admire is how tough they are. The first ones are out in spring and the last bee is usually seen in the fall. While they fly much slower than a honeybee (average 21 km/h), the bumblebee (around 11 km/h) can handle stiff winds to forage.

I've taken photos of the Bombus rufocinctus, or redbelted bumblebee that feasts on my wild roses. It is very common in Calgary. It has a short tongue and a good variety of flowers it can use, including yarrow, asters, prairie clover, blanket flowers, sunflowers, lupins, and snowberries. I have a few of these native plants that 'my' bumblebees can gather from ensuring a continuous supply of nectar and pollen from early spring to late fall.

But it is the non-native plants that are mobbed in my yard: the globe thistle and catmint have been winning hands down. Both are easy to grow, hardy, and give bumblebees a chance to thrive.

The Alberta Native Bee Council provides a lot of information on native bees.



A Few Words on Birds -Ruddy Duck

If you see a Ruddy Duck, be sure to exclaim in a British Accent, "It's a Ruddy Duck!". In Britain, "ruddy" is used as an intensifier (i.e., it's ruddy cold out), so it's like saying, "This is the duckiest duck", which isn't untrue when it comes to the Ruddy Duck. To be honest the name has a more boring origin, it actually comes from the breeding male, ruddy refers to its reddish plumage.

The Ruddy Duck comes back to Calgary earlier than most birds, usually in March. By April, you can head out to Frank Lake to see one of these fascinating ducks. The most unusual thing about them is the bright blue bill that the male sports in the breeding season. It's so nice to see some bright colours on animals around here, most seem to be dun-coloured, blending in with their surroundings. It's such a thrill to spot the bright blue through your binoculars. Eat your heart out, tropics! We may colour our houses brown and beige, but we do have a blue-billed duck.

On Frank Lake the Ruddy Duck is seen paddling around with its chest out, a black cap, white cheeks, and a tail sticking straight up behind it; they are unmistakable. If you are lucky, you will see its funny little courtship dance where it bobs its head up and down and hits its bill on the water, all the while making ticking and clapping sounds. It is also one of the more aggressive ducks and I have seen it swim after other ducks around it. Its feet are further back on its body than most ducks, so it is ungainly on land. This also means it sticks its chest out like a little boxer, looking even more aggressive; "You want a piece of me!" should be its breeding cry instead of ticking and clapping. Although this duck is a squat little thing it is very aerodynamic underwater and can dive a metre with one kick of its foot. It also uses its stiff tail like a rudder. It has the ability to escape predators by slowly sinking straight down into the water without a ripple. I guess it knows when to leave a fight too.

The Ruddy Duck is native to North America, but someone brought a group to England and they escaped! They are now an invasive species living in the wild there and are apparently spreading to Europe. Probably beating up the weak European ducks as they go. We only hear

about the species that were brought here and escaped. It seems like if you bring a group of birds anywhere new, they will invariably escape and start upsetting the local bird populations. Maybe we should just stop moving them around?

The eggs of the hen are very large, compared to their body weight they are the largest of all the ducks. They are also almost spherical. A hen can lay one per day, and the clutch she ends up with can exceed her body weight! The eggs are big, but the upside is out of them come big ducklings that are soon ready to swim by themselves.

All this combines to make a unique and charming little duck that I love seeing every year at Frank Lake. Make the trip and you might see the Ruddy picking fights and then slowly disappearing under the water to escape them.

Dear Neighbours,

I would like to share with you some good news, Imperial Oil is investing \$720 million to build a new renewable diesel facility – the largest facility of its kind in Canada.

Due to Alberta's competitive taxes, skilled workers, and strong economic outlook, our province continues to be a top destination for investment. This significant capital commitment from Imperial Oil shows our plan is working to attract investment and grow the economy.
